Absolutes

Marvin Marion Henry

July 20, 1915—September 10, 2016

Marvin Marion Henry, born July 20, 1915 passed away peacefully on September 10, 2016. He was preceded in death by his wife Martha Young Henry after 63 wonderful years of marriage. F or the past 60 years, he was a 32nd degree Master Mason at Hill City Lodge No. 456 A.F. & A.M., a member of the Jesters, Alzafar and Ben Hur Temples.

Brother Henry is survived by his daughter Martha Jo Henry Blaylock and husband Brent; his son Marvin Chet Henry and wife Liz; 6 grandchildren and 10 great grandchildren.

He was an avid trumpet player who loved Dixieland Music and was still entertaining at the age of 100. Marvin, a World War II veteran and one of the survivors of the greatest generation was the longest tenured Texas CPA.

Brother Marvin Marion Henry was initiated as an Entered Apprentice on February 14, 1956, Passed to the Degree of Fellow Craft on January 22, 1957 and Raised to the Sublime Degree of a Master Mason on February 26, 1957 at Hill City Lodge No. 456 A.F. & A. M. in Austin, Texas. He received his 50 year service award on November 14, 2006 and his 60 Year Service Award on August 16, 2016 by the Grand Lodge of Texas.

And so it has come to pass, a Brother Master Mason having completed all the design's laid down on the Trestleboard of Life, has answered the summons of the Grand Warden of Heaven and Earth and has entered into the Grand Lodge over which the Supreme Grand Master of the Universe presides. Our article for this month, perhaps more than most, is intended to guide the mind of the reader from some fairly clear and simple concepts into one of the most complicated realms of thought and practice in which Masons are expected to excel. We hope that each of you will revisit this topic over months and even years and we will endeavor to make it available for your repeated reading.

Among all of our working tools, three stand out as being most fundamentally important to ourselves, as individual Masons, to our Lodges and to our Fraternity as a whole – the square, level and plumb. These tools are held in the highest esteem and importance by being used as the emblem of those "indispensable" officers of the Lodge. There is little doubt that the use of these working tools by operative Masons provided the most critical reference points required for the excellent practice of the builder's craft. They were, and are, known to represent absolutes – a 90-degree or right angle, a true horizontal and a true vertical. We are taught that the building of King Solomon's temple represented excellent craftsmanship but could still only be called high on the scale that was recognize to distinguish the "handiwork" of God from that of human hands.

We all remember the lessons drawn from those operative working tools and their parallel use by speculative Masons, where they still represent absolutes and should be taken as such. But perhaps that simple description of King Solomon's temple was to instill upon us that absolutes, or perfection, are the domain of the Supreme Architect of the Universe. Today, engineering could be considered a modern-day derivative of the operative Mason's craft and skills. In the language of engineering, a permissible deviation from a specified measurement of a building or object is called tolerance. How fitting is it that the same term is so frequently mentioned as Masons discuss how we symbolically apply our Masonic edifices to our Brothers, our family and our neighbors ?

Does the application of tolerance mean that we no longer need to contemplate the absolutes in our own behavior or that of others? Certainly not. Too much deviation from the square, the horizontal and the vertical would cause a physical building to fall and so it is with our speculative Masonic edifice that equips us for our journey through life. How then, do we as Masons come to understand the right amount of tolerance to apply to our daily lives and interactions? Perhaps this is the most difficult question faced by man or Mason, or any person in all of humanity. Fortunately, the majority of Masonic lessons, both esoteric and historical, the symbols, landmarks and traditions given us, and the ongoing earning of our Master Mason's wages, all contribute in one way or another to our understanding of that right amount of tolerance.

One of the first things to contemplate in purposefully building our practice of tolerance is that it is not a uniform thing that covers all things

Hello Brothers,

As we all know, this month is the month we all get with our families and feast. Thanksgiving is one of the biggest holidays in the United States and it's been a tradition for several decades. When we think of Thanksgiving decorations we typically picture a turkey, some falls leaves and the cornucopia. When I was growing up, my family used to always throw the holiday gettogethers. I remember always seeing my mom place a cornucopia in the middle of the table and never really thought much about it until now.

The cornucopia is most commonly associated with Greek mythology and Zeus. Legend states that Zeus was hidden from his father by his mother when he was a child. Kronos, Zeus' father, had eaten Zeus' siblings to prevent the prophecy that one of his children would destroy him. While Zeus was in hiding from his father, he was fed and cared for by various divine attendants including Amalthea (the Nourishing Goddess) who appeared in the form of a goat. The legend states that Zeus accidentally broke off one her horns. Later he gave the horn to the world of man as it would provide whatever was desired.

As we all know, the cornucopia is the symbol and jewel for the stewards in freemasonry and referred to as the horn of plenty. The Stewards are stationed in the masonic south and the masonic south tied with nourishment of the brothers. It makes sense because the cornucopia is a symbol of plenty and abundance, and as such has been adopted as the jewel of the Stewards of a Lodge, to remind them that it is their duty to see that the tables are properly furnished at refreshment, and that every Brother is suitably served.

Fraternally, Elan Mendoza Junior Warden, Hill City 456 and all situations like a blanket. It has texture and contours as was discussed in one of our articles last year titled "Trust". My wife clearly holds the definition of a clean kitchen as an absolute and almost always affords herself little tolerance. I have a bit more tolerance when I clean the kitchen on a normal day, and even greater tolerance when my wife is visiting her sister for 10 days. Yet I have a completely different view and tolerance about paying our bills on time.

Perhaps it is a penalty for failing to adhere to a requirement as an absolute in our lives that has the first, and most dramatic, impact on the tolerance we apply in a given situation. Even so, as we build our model of tolerance, and mature in our practice of it, the virtuous aim point moves further from, and becomes more of our operative guide than, the point at which a penalty is applied. This is well understood when we recall our Masonic obligations and respective penalties and in the common adage "Character is what you do when no one is watching".

But this discussion of absolutes and tolerance is not strictly about ourselves but also about our view of others. That is where it becomes even more challenging and more important. The are so many elements to consider in a decision on the tolerance given to another that cannot be completely covered here. But these points remain, to this writer, as particularly important in continuing to build a fine and robust Masonic edifice. And, as is typically the case with these articles, these are not complete answers or guidance but only signposts toward further contemplation by the reader.

Don't take the easy route of ignoring, accepting and excusing every transgression by every person in every circumstance in the name of politeness or social accommodation. That is likely to eventually lead to real harm to oneself or others. We are put on this Earth to make a contribution, not to simply watch it go by.

Remember the earlier discussion on actively teaching. Sharing one's perspectives on discipline and virtue, when others are notably lax, is a form of giving when delivered in the appropriate time and manner. Just remember that kindness is always appropriate.

Finally, true character is demonstrated when the one applies to others at least as much tolerance as one applies to himself. Remember that we never fully understand everything in the mind or experience of another, or his cabletow.

I believe that most people spend much of their lives figuring out how to use appropriate tolerance.
