#### Physics at Work in the Lodge

At the recent Past Masters meeting, someone used the word "disarray" to describe the Lodge, relative to it functioning as he saw it. We don't need to identify the person who said it, or debate the accuracy of the assessment. But if that perception is widely held, or might be considered accurate, let's consider the solution for it as described in ... physics.

In physics, things that interact in certain ways are called "systems" and, according to the notion of entropy, all systems naturally tend toward a state of disorder or disarray. Continuing in the vein of physics, resisting that tendency toward disarray – or certainly reversing it - requires two things: one or more organizing principles and energy. I think most would agree that we in the Craft and in the Lodge have sufficient organizing principles in Masonic law, landmarks, traditions and so forth. That leaves one simple thing – energy. We are not talking about the theoretical energy in the hearts and minds that the Brethren say they would contribute. 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## Cathedrals

Although it is not known how lodges became completely speculative, it is known that Grand Lodge speculative Masonry evolved out of the guilds of operative Masons who had built the cathedrals. Somewhere along the line our forbearers went from building that house made with hands to building that house not made with hands.

The story of Masonry was well under way by the time Gothic cathedrals were constructed. The style of churches before Gothic was Romanesque. Romanesque cathedrals used circular Roman arches and carefully squared thick walls. The geometry used in Romanesque architecture is comparatively simple.

The advent of Gothic architecture involved a number of advances, some of which have since been lost. In modern times we use calculus to describe and analyse Gothic structures, yet they were built centuries before calculus was invented. The Masons who built the Gothic cathedrals must have used sophisticated geometric methods no longer known. These methods were taught in an apprenticeship system that kept secrets. I suspect that the third degree teaches the danger of keeping secrets in this manner.

Think or the type of arch used in Gothic architecture. It is a truncated arch with a peak at the top. The peak serves as a keystone that holds the arch together so it does not suffer the slow decay problem of the Roman circular arch. It also allows the Gothic arch to be much taller than the Roman arch. Gothic buildings are collections of Gothic arches of various sizes filled with delicate curved walls and coloured glass.

Next, think of the many levels of Gothic buildings. The outer layer is half arches that are short. Then there are layer after layer of progressively taller arches until we reach the central arch. The balance of each tier is very exacting to offset sideways forces.

Gothic cathedrals were built by skilled craftsmen who were taught in layers of apprenticeship connected by religion. Gothic cathedrals were built of layered half arches connected by colored windows and thin walls. Gothic cathedrals were built of cross upon cross, number upon number, symbol upon symbol.

That's what I think of when I ask myself what that house made with hands was. What do you think was made with hands?

In fact, I asked my father many years prior to that when I asked him about the strange ring inside a clear pyramid sitting on his desk at home, but the first time I could receive a satisfactory answer was ten years ago. Ten years: a decade. My initiation as an Entered Apprentice was in May 2006.</li> <li>In those ten years, I've taken more than a few vows, the most important of which was with my wife before God and our friends and family in June of last year. I've received an education within the craft, at university, and in life that few can ever have. In fact, I firmly believe in the maxim: the more I learn, the more I realize how much I don't know.</li> <li>Perhaps the greatest lesson I've learned to date is, while I can accomplish some things on my own, I cannot accomplish all things. Most of the time, I've found myself asking for help: my wife for a science-based question, my parents on a life lesson, a Past Grand Master or two to make a phone call for a job, in nearly all aspects of my life, I've had to ask for help. And perhaps that is the greatest lesson I've learned in my decade in the lodge: the necessity that I cannot do all things myself, and that I need help.
