He then addressed the beggar: "Brother, I hope you are not angry with me because I can find no coin." The trace of a smile crept to the face of the beggar. A dim light come into his eyes. 

Officer and Brother Brent Thompson

On Thursday July 7, 2016, DART Police Officer and Brother Brent Thompson was killed in the line of duty during a Dallas, Texas police ambush. Brother Thompson was a Police Officer for the Dallas Transit Police Department and a Master Mason (member of Corsicana Lodge No. 174 in Corsicana). His death marks the first time a DART officer has been killed in the line of duty. Brother Thompson joined DART police in 2009, according to the transit agency, which established a police department in 1989. Military records indicate Brother that Thompson served in the Marines during the early 1990s and then graduated from the Navarro College Police Academy in 1997, according to a spokeswoman for the school, which is located in Corsicana, Texas.

Before he joined the transit force, Brother Thompson spent nearly five years working for DynCorp International, an American private military contractor, as an international police liaison officer in Iraq and Afghanistan. He supervised American police officers who were training and mentoring Iraqi officers, including in Baghdad, Basra and the country's north. He had also been based in Afghanistan, in Helmand and Kandahar Provinces.

Brother Thompson leaves behind a wife, several children, and numerous family members. If you like, an online fund has been set up at the following link:

"Brethren, Carl William Goericke, Sr., laid down his working tools, surrounded by his loving family, early Thursday morning, July 7, 2016. Carl was born the son of Henry Goericke and Grace Solomon Goericke in Elgin, Texas, on May 10, 1927. He attended schools in Sea Drift and Elgin, before leaving early to join the United States Navy during World War II.

After the war, Carl realized "he could walk better than he could swim," and joined the United States Army. Shortly into his enlistment, he became involved in the Korean Conflict. While stationed at Fort Rucker, Ala., he met the love of his life, Annie Ruth Cotton. On Dec. 18, 1951, the two united in Holy Matrimony.

Carl moved his young bride all over the world with the military and in 1958, they made Austin, Texas, their home. Carl worked hard his whole life, working as an HVAC Technician for Texas State Hospital, Texas Capital Complex, and many years at Brackenridge Hospital, where he retired due to heart complications. He loved to travel, fishing, and camping with his wife and family. Carl also spent his time keeping honey bees and was a member of the Williamson County Bee Keepers Association. He served as a Deacon at several Assembly of God churches throughout the Austin area over the years. He was a 33 Degree Mason at the Scottish Rite Temple of Austin, where he loved to cook and served for more than 50 years.

On May 30, 2016, he was preceded in death by his beloved wife of 65 years, Annie Ruth Goericke. He wsa also preceded in death by both of his parents; his older brother, Henry Goericke, Jr.; sister, Betty Lou Riddings; and his granddaughter, Christina Grace Brunken.
