#### A Time of Thanksgiving.

The month of November is a special time in our country. Naturally, it's when we celebrate Thanksgiving. A time when we come together with family, or friends who are like family, and give thanks for the blessings bestowed on us all. Because of this, I thought it appropriate to reprint the first Proclamation of Thanksgiving from the President George Washington:

Whereas it is the duty of all nations to acknowledge the providence of Almighty God, to obey His will, to be grateful for His benefits, and humbly to implore His protection and favor; and Whereas both Houses of Congress have, by their joint committee, requested me to "recommend to the people of the United States a day of public thanksgiving and prayer, to be observed by acknowledging with grateful hearts the many and signal favors of Almighty God, especially by affording them an opportunity peaceably to establish a form of government for their safety and happiness:"

Now, therefore, I do recommend and assign Thursday, the 26th day of November next, to be devoted by the people of these States to the service of that great and glorious Being who is the beneficent author of all the good that was, that is, or that will be; that we may then all unite in rendering unto Him our sincere and humble thanks for His kind care and

protection of the people of this country previous to their becoming a nation; for the signal and manifold mercies and the favorable interpositions of His providence in the course and conclusion of the late war; for the great degree of tranquility, union, and plenty which we have since enjoyed; for the peaceable and rational manner in which we have been enable to establish constitutions of government for our safety and happiness, and particularly the national one now lately instituted for the civil and religious liberty with which we are blessed, and the means we have of acquiring and diffusing useful knowledge; and, in general, for all the great and various favors which He has been pleased to confer upon us.

And also that we may then unite in most humbly offering our prayers and supplications to the great Lord and Ruler of Nations and beseech Him to pardon our national and other transgressions; to enable us all, whether in public or private stations, to perform our several and relative duties properly and punctually; to render our National Government a blessing to all the people by constantly being a Government of wise, just, and constitutional laws, discreetly and faithfully executed and obeyed; to protect and guide all sovereigns and nations (especially such as have shown kindness to us), and to bless them with good governments, peace, and concord; to promote the knowledge and practice of true religion and virtue, and the increase of science among them and us; and, generally to grant unto all mankind such a degree of temporal prosperity as He alone knows to be best.

Given under my hand, at the city of New York, the 3d day of October, A.D. 1789.

From the South	Politics and Masonry
<ul> <li>From the South</li> <li>Brethren,</li> <li>We all should know what the Three Great Lights in Masonry are. They are in plain sight upon the altar. Of these, according to Henry P. H. Bromwell in his work, <u>Restorations of Masonic Geometry Being A Dissertation Of The Lost Knowledges Of The Lodge</u>, the Holy Bible which is first Great Light represents communication. He wrote that it must be more than a symbol, wholly divorced from actual speech. He goes on to write that it must represent and also exhibit in fact some form of that transcendent and marvelous faculty and means of communication the <i>human language</i> —not in vocal sounds but by means of the noblest art known to mankind, written words, in alphabetic or syllabic form to represent words. In the Holy Bible or other writings, language is not possible in the absence of the living soul or spirit which both wills and understands and so intends and hence the First Great Light conjoins and completes the representatives of the second and third by adding thoughts and words to their expression of ideas—words. Which are themselves are symbols of a more perfect order.</li> <li>He writes that for the purpose of holding the first place it need not be any particular book nor in any particular language that it does not have to be any book at all. And inscribed tablet of stone or tile or plate of metal, wax or clay, indented after the style of cuneiform inscriptions or a painted scroll of papyrus or pelt can serve to accomplish the intent and contain that which would</li> </ul>	One of the fundamental practices of Freemasonry is that we do not discuss religion or politics in lodge. That prohibition is carried out into the world to an extent. Most Regular Masonic jurisdictions enjoin a practice of restricting the use of masonic symbols. For instance, in California we are enjoined not to use the Square and Compass device on our business cards, in our business logo, on our business signage and in our politics. So when we find a brother using the square and compass to promote his political views, it is all the more surprising. Recently, a brother expressed support for a third party candidate for political office. On the surface, there is no problem with a brother, or any citizen, choosing to support someone for office. The problem arises when a mason, using a forum marked as masonic, regardless of personal disclaimers, advocates as a mason, his support for a political candidate. Some brothers have noted that what he has done is little different from placing a political sticker on a car that also has masonic badges on it, though the argument is little disingenuous. The only reason for posting a political opinion on a blog ostensibly aimed at masons is to reach out TO masons, to push your opinion as a mason onto masons. Keeping in mind my own credo regarding
Hill City presents to all newly Master Masons the Bible on which they placed right hand during the initiations. We tell them "that in this book, the Holy writings, which is the volume of the sacred	valuable instrument by which we are taught to circumscribe our passions and keep them within due bounds toward all mankind, particularly our brethren in freemasonry.

Because politics are divisive by their very nature, we, as Freemasons, should not be playing at them and aiming them at our brethren. Posting political opinion to masons is akin to using the lodge mailing list to send out political flyers on lodge letterhead. This is never a good thing, and is only cause for distention from brothers who do not agree with the candidate/position being advocated in their name. We should always remember that freemasonry is about improving ourselves, not selling soaps, powders, or politics, and anything that detracts from that lofty goal should be avoided. After all, there is a time and a place for religious observation and a time and a place for politics. Lodge is not a place for them, and mailing to, or reaching out to brothers on a forum, blog or web space set aside or dedicated to freemasonry is not the place for such a divisive topic as political advocacy. May the blessings of heaven rest upon us and all regular masons. May brotherly love prevail, and every moral and social virtue, cement us.	<ul> <li>We should think of funerals as outreach opportunities. At Lazarus' death, Jesus wept and the people said "See how much he loved him". His weeping showed those around Lazarus' tomb that Jesus cared. The same is true at the funerals we attend today.
