And what of M.W. King Solomon's order that the first word given will govern Freemasonry until future generations shall find out the right. That was 3,000 years ago. Have other generations discovered the secrets that died with our Great and Good Grand Master? If not, could ours be that generation that solves that ancient mystery?

The good news is that the mystery has already been solved. The York Rite Degrees provide the crucial narrative of what happened after a new government for Masons was set up by King Solomon, through the destruction of the first temple, and finally, providing that crucial Masonic link between classical antiquity and chivalric lore. In the York Rite, the Master Mason learns that all is never lost, and through faith and zeal, hope springs eternal, much like if a tree is cut down, it will sprout again (Job 14:7)

The Austin York Rite will be having a two-weekend Festival to confer the Degrees this Spring. The Chapter and Council Degrees will be conferred on Saturday, May 20, at the Historic Austin York Rite Temple located on 311 W. 7th St., between Guadalupe and Lavaca Sts. The Commandery Orders will be conferred on Saturday, June 3, at the same location.

The Chapter degrees continue the story of the erection of the Temple, and progress the legend of King Solomon. Eventually, you'll learn the history of Babylonian Exile, and the emancipation of the Judeans back to their homeland to build the Second Temple. The Council degrees give a back story to King Solomon and our Grand and Good Grand Master. Finally, the story shifts to the crusades, as the Commandery tells the story of the Knights Templar, climaxing with the Order of the Temple, perhaps the most beautiful degree in all of Freemasonry.

Travel and visitation have always been an integral and important part of Masonry. I read this paper written by Brother Bill Holser. He was made a Master Mason in 2002 in Three Rivers Lodge #733 in Indiana. He has affiliated with Roff Lodge #169 in Oklahoma and Lebanon Lodge #837 in Frisco, Texas.

Dangerous Travels

Recently, I've been thinking about the founding of my mother Grand Lodge in Indiana. In 2018, the Grand Lodge of Indiana will celebrate their bicentennial. In January 1818, Freemasons from nine lodges, working under charters by the Grand Lodge of Kentucky and the Grand Lodge of Ohio gathered in Madison, Indiana to start the process of organizing their own future. Back in that day, there were very few choices of transportation by which you could travel across a newly formed state; you could travel by riverboat down the Ohio river (if your town was near the river and you could afford the fare), you could travel via horseback (down rough paths which could hardly qualify as a trail) and if you didn't own a horse, you walked.

No matter which mode of transportation you chose, the journey was guaranteed to be uncomfortable; muddy trails, snow and high winds combined to make the trip difficult. Depending on where you lived, your destination may be several days (or even weeks) away. In the winter, you slept on the cold ground, shivering under a blanket near a fire, eating what meager provisions you brought.

Report of Steering Committee on the State of Masonry in the Local Community

At the January 3rd Stated Meeting of Hill City Lodge # 456 AF & AM, Worshipful Master Charles Maddox created a steering committee to investigate and report back on the state of Masonry in and around the jurisdiction of Hill City Lodge. He instructed the committee to report back by the March 7th Stated Meeting with the opportunity to request additional time if necessary. In order to organize and schedule visits to the various neighboring lodges the committee did request additional time.

The Worshipful Master assigned Brothers Bob Wheeless, Lee Kinser, Robert Eschenburg, Larry Miller, Chuck Stewart, Don Jarrell, and Richard Garrett to the committee. Brother Jarrell encountered business conflicts with his duties on the committee and was replaced by Brother Luke Michaels.

The first task the committee tackled was the development of survey questions. All total the committee developed over forty questions that were eventually reduced to eight general questions related to: Attendance, New Members, Communications, and Community Involvement and three questions specifically related to Hill City Lodge. A copy of the survey is attached to this report. Surprisingly the survey was not as well received as the committee expected. The responses however were forthright and did contain valuable insights.

The following comments are how the respondents thought Masonry could improve its image and increase attendance. The number one way to get attention is to seek it. It is much easier to reach a larger audience via electronic communications so we have to follow the audience. Hill City has a web page: http://hillcitylodge.org. There is a warning concerning the security of this site and advising not to post sensitive information on it. On first glance, the first page is not an attention getter. Our target audience for new Masons is

the millennial generation. The lodge might reach this target audience by enlisting a young web master or paying to have the webpage maintained and updated with images of younger masons and Masonic mantras that relate to their thoughts and ideas.

The lodge has at least two confusing Face Book pages, Hill City 456 and hill city lodge #456, A.F.& A.M. - Austin, Texas. Both Facebook pages are rarely used, outdated and poorly organized. There are only thirteen brethren that are friends on the Face Book Page.

Twitter is an online news and social networking service where users post and interact with messages, "tweets," restricted to 140 characters. Registered users can post tweets, but those who are unregistered can only read them. Hill City Lodge does not have a Twitter account at this time.

One section of the survey focused on ways to increase and maintain attendance. Some of the responses were critical of masonry but they offer insight into how lodges can improve. If these responses are adopted masonry has a chance to reverse the current downward trend of interest and attendance.

Why would a lodge member want to attend a meeting that the lodge officers won't attend? Every lodge officer has a responsibility to his lodge. Every lodge officer has a specific job. When lodge officers understand and practice their jobs in the lodge building as well as in the lodge room, the brethren are served well.

One suggestion was to have all top line signers become mentors for the brethren they bring into masonry. These new brothers thought enough of a Mason to ask him to sign the top line of his petition. Masonry tends to become disinterested in new members once they have fulfilled the requirements of admission. This disinterest caused many to feel used and left by the wayside. Lodges must encourage involvement in degrees

and committees. In addition, opportunities that offer family involvement, social and volunteer activities are appealing to younger generations. Finally the most simple and most effective way to increase involvement is to keep in touch with our new members.

Social cliques, shyness and disinterest cause visitors and members to feel unwelcome. Masons need to be more open and welcoming. Use games and relationship building activities to provide opportunities for brethren to get to know each other better.

The apparent lack of convenient parking is one of the major obstacles than hinder attendance. The lodges that meet in the Scottish Rite Temple can park for free after five o'clock in the state parking lot located just south of the Hampton Inn. The Lodges that meet in the York Rite Building have four permitted spots in front of the building and can park in the garage next door for \$10. There may be negotiations in progress to access the garage free of charge.

Many respondents felt that Stated Meetings last too long. Unfortunately, lodges have to follow the order of business approved by the Grand Lodge. There may be items that could be taken care of during meals; standing committee reports, the JW's reading from Grand Lodge Law and the Masonic Education topic but this question must be referred to the DDGM for his advice.

An excellent suggestion is to establish revolving Stated Meeting committees; ask brothers to form kitchen committees to be responsible for the planning, cooking, serving and cleaning up.

Bearing in mind that in Masonry it is the internal and not the external, no lodge has a written dress code. Most encourage officers to dress per the occasion. Business attire for officers at Stated Meetings and casual business for Called meetings. Most lodges frown on shirts with offensive slogans, and shorts.

No lodge is going to attract the attention of a nonmason without some effort. Current members have friends, relatives, and friends of relatives that could be mined for members. Community involvement at festivals and other public functions are excellent sources to be visible. Also the above mentioned online resources generate interest. Right now, Lodge 12 is the only lodge with a defined program for non-masons. The other lodges in District 50 rely on open installations and award ceremonies as opportunities to introduce visitors to the lodge buildings and masonry.

The committee was interested in knowing if local lodges participated in actives outside of the lodge. This question drew more of a social response. Responders listed picnics, drinks after lodge, charitable events, concerts, lodge visitations, card games and small gatherings as member's homes.

When asked about community oriented programs the responders listed: participation in Grand Lodge Programs directed at school age children, Scholarship and Lamar Medal presentations, direct involvement with public schools, volunteer involvement in hospitals, cook-offs and blood drives.

The committee wanted to find out how Hill City is perceived in the local Masonic community. Two questions were about familiarly and frequency of visitation to our lodge. The most important question dealt with how Hill City is perceived in the Masonic community. There is a persistent rumor that our lodge is racist. This response did not surface in any of the responses, instead the response was that our lodge is respected and considered as vital to the District. One respondent said that Hill City Lodge is the most influential lodge in the district and we need to start acting like it.

While this survey was not well received in the district, the respondents provided useful insights that if taken to heart provide an excellent opportunity for Hill City Lodge to grow and create an atmosphere of true brotherly love.

William (Bill) Wendell Reynolds

Brother William (Bill) Wendell Reynolds, 88, of Austin, Texas went to be with his Lord and Savior on March 10, 2017. He was born July 2, 1928 in Terrell, Texas. And at the age of 8, moved to Austin where he lived and worked the rest of his life.

Bill is survived by his wife, Joyce L. Reynolds; son, Dale W. Reynolds; daughter, Vicki J. Stotts and her husband Dennis M. Stotts; grandchildren, Sandy Bradford and her husband Michael Bradford, and Dennis David Stotts; great-grandchildren, Austin and Jaxon Bradford.

At the age of 18, Bill joined the United States Army and served during the Korean War. After returning to civilian life, he enrolled in business school where he met and later married Joyce, his wife of 66 years. Bill's career spaned approximately 43 years with the State of Texas; working first for the Texas Highway Department and later, the Railroad Commission of Texas.

Brother Reynolds was a 59-year Mason. He was initiated as an Entered Apprentice on October 15, 1957, passed to the degree of Fellow Craft on December 17, 1957, and raised to the sublime degree of a Master Mason on January 28, 1958 in Hill City Lodge, No. 456. Bill's father, William Mason Reynolds was also a Mason.

A memorial service was held in Bill's memory at 1:30pm on Wednesday, March 22, 2017 at Northwest Hills United Methodist Church, 7050 Village Center Drive, Austin, Texas followed by a reception and visitation in the Family Life Center of the church immediately following the service.
