Brethren,

For the October stated meeting, we received our second official visit from the District Deputy Grand Master. I'm pleased to say Hill City had a good turnout, good food, and good hospitality for the DDGM.

The Grand Master's letter reminded us that "there are no unimportant parts or members of our fraternity. No one else can do your part, my part, or the Grandmaster's part".

This is an excellent lesson to contemplate on: the whole of Masonry is us coming together to work (on making ourselves and our communities better). No one is made important in Masonry simply for their status or job within the fraternity; showing up and paying the bills every month is empty except that in it provides a place where we come together for our true work. All the brethren assembling is the whole of Masonry (not anyone's responsibility or authority in the lodge).

The Grand Master's letter continued, "Freemasonry is judged by our communities, by our contribution to society." With that in mind, Hill City is going to recontinue keeping records of the brethren's charitable work for the community (counted in terms both of hours spent in service and miles driven). We started strong at the beginning of the current Grand Lodge year (with many of our members traveling a long distance to clean Texas beaches), but there's no reason not to do better.

All of our members are or should be doing good work for the community, and there's nothing wrong with taking recognition for it (in fact, the Grand Lodge needs this data in order periodically justify our exemption from ad valorem tax -- so please make sure to inform the Senior Warden about your community service.)

The Lodge voted on a new petition for the mysteries this month, which means we now have twice as much degree work to enjoy. It is exciting to see the lodge get back on track raising more men to become brethren. Earlier I alluded to that "true work" (which is the improvement of ourselves and our communities), but it also includes improvement of our fraternity. The important part cannot happen without bringing new brethren into the whole.

With that in mind, we hope to see you for the events in store for October and our next stated meeting.

10 Things About the Winter Solstice

Winter Solstice (continued)

1. Winter and Summer Solstice

In the Northern Hemisphere, the December Solstice is the winter solstice and the shortest day of the year.

In the Southern Hemisphere, it is summer solstice and the longest day of the year, because equinoxes and solstices are on opposite sides of the planet.

2. A Specific Point in Time

Most people count the whole day as the December Solstice. However, the Solstice is actually at a specific moment - when the Sun is exactly overhead the Tropic of Capricorn.

In 2018, the December Solstice is on December 21. Due to the Time Zone difference, some locations will have their solstice on a different date.

3. Second Solstice of the Year

Solstices happen twice a year - once around June 21 and then again around December 21. On the June Solstice, the Sun is directly overhead the Tropic of Cancer (latitude 23° 30′ North) in the Northern Hemisphere, while on the December Solstice, the Sun shines directly over the Tropic of Capricorn (latitude 23° 30′ South) in the Southern Hemisphere.

4. The Date Varies

The December Solstice can happen on December 20, 21, 22 or 23, though December 20 or 23 solstices are rare. The last December 23 solstice was in 1903 and will not happen again until 2303.

5. The Sun 'Stands Still'

The term solstice comes from the Latin word solstitium, meaning 'the Sun stands still'. This is because on this day, the Sun reaches its southernmost position as seen from the Earth. The Sun seems to stand still at the Tropic of Capricorn and then reverses its direction. It's also common to call it the day the Sun turns around.

6. It's the First Day of Astronomical Winter

In the Northern Hemisphere, astronomers and scientists use the December Solstice as the start of the winter season, which ends on the March Equinox. For meteorologists, on the other hand, winter began three weeks ago on December 1.

7. The Earth Isn't Farthest From the Sun

During winter in the Northern Hemisphere, the Earth is actually closest to the Sun. Seasons occur because Earth orbits the Sun on a slant, with an axial tilt of around 23.4 degrees. Therefore different amounts of sunlight reach the Northern and Southern Hemispheres, causing variation in temperatures and weather patterns throughout the year.

In fact, the Earth is on its Perihelion - the point on the Earth's orbit closest to the Sun - a few weeks after the December Solstice.

8. Earliest Sunset Not on the Solstice

Most places in the Northern Hemisphere see their earliest sunset a few days before the Solstice and their latest sunrise a few days after the Solstice. This happens because of the difference between how we measure time using watches and the time measured by a sundial.

9. Daylight Hours Increase Faster in the North

If you are in the Northern Hemisphere, the increase rate of daylight hours depends on your location's latitude - in more northern latitudes you will see a rapid increase in daylight hours compared to if you're in the more southern latitudes.

10. Celebrated Around the World

Many cultures around the world hold feasts and celebrate holidays around the December Solstice.
