From the West

Greetings, Brethren.

In March Hill City received its first official visit of the Grand Lodge year from our new Deputy District Grand Master, Br. Dermit.

If you think this visit is merely the twice-yearly event where the DDGM sits in the East and reads the Grand Master's proclamation at the end, then you aren't fully aware of what work the District Deputy is doing on behalf of Grand Lodge in the district.

The DDGM is also responsible for verifying that lodges are performing their mandatory legal and Masonic obligations, such as submitting "form 990" to the IRS and the "form 71 minimum audit" to Grand Lodge. These responsibilities are critical because they're required for Masonry in Texas to continue as a tax-free institution. Lodges that fail to follow-through on these responsibilities jeopardize other lodges in the state.

For March, all three called meetings are for performing an EA degree. I wonder if anyone can recall that ever happening before? Don't forget to say thanks to the degree team for their hard work.

In Stated Meeting this month, the lodge also voted to initiate an additional candidate into the mysteries of Masonry.

A motion was also put forward this month to raise dues to \$80 per year. The last time our lodge raised dues was 2014, and Hill City dues are on the lower side of the spectrum compared to most Masonic lodges (and much cheaper than many fraternal organizations).

By raising the dues, we are doing the right thing for our body: it allows the lodge to remain financially healthy, so it can continue to educate generations of Masons to come. Those future Masons won't find "cheap" what Hill City has to offer them, because Masonry teaches truths which cannot be measured monetarily. Although it would be nice if the lodge didn't have bills to pay, your dues are a good value for what the Lodge does for its brotherhood and community.

Finally, I'd like to remind everyone that the closest Grand Master's Conference this year is here in Austin on April 6th. It's located at the Ben Hur Shrine on 7811 Rockwood Lane in Austin, with registration at 2 pm and the proceedings at 3. Attendance from members of Hill City counts towards the Lodge's Vanguard award, so make sure to join us there.

The Battle of the Alamo

The Battle of the Alamo (February 23 – March 6, 1836) was a pivotal event in the Texas Revolution. Following a 13-day siege, Mexican troops under President General Antonio López de Santa Anna reclaimed the Alamo Mission near San Antonio de Béxar (modern-day San Antonio, Texas, United States), killing the Texian and immigrant occupiers. Santa Anna's cruelty during the battle inspired many Texians, both legal Texas settlers and illegal immigrants from the United States, to join the Texian Army. Buoyed by a desire for revenge, the Texians defeated the Mexican Army at the Battle of San Jacinto, on April 21, 1836, ending the rebellion.

Several months previously, Texians had driven all Mexican troops out of Mexican Texas. About 100 Texians were then garrisoned at the Alamo. The Texian force grew slightly with the arrival of reinforcements led by eventual Alamo commanders James Bowie and William B. Travis. On February 23, approximately 1,500 Mexicans marched into San Antonio de Béxar as the first step in a campaign to retake Texas. For the next 10 days, the two armies engaged in several skirmishes with minimal casualties. Aware that his garrison could not withstand an attack by such a large force, Travis wrote multiple letters pleading for more men and supplies from Texas and from the United States, but the Texians were reinforced by fewer than 100 men because the United States had a treaty with Mexico, and supplying men and weapons would have been an overt act of war.

In the early morning hours of March 6, the Mexican Army advanced on the Alamo. After repelling two attacks, the Texians were unable to fend off a third attack. As Mexican soldiers scaled the walls, most of the Texian fighters withdrew into interior buildings. Occupiers unable to reach these points were slain by the Mexican cavalry as they attempted to escape. Between five and seven Texians may have surrendered; if so, they were quickly executed. Most eyewitness accounts reported between 182

Masonic Funerals

Masonic funerals are a much more personal rite and are conducted at the request of the deceased Brother or his family. It is a service in which all Masons can demonstrate the respect and brotherly love and affection that cements our fraternity into one common bond. At a time when the family and community are feeling the loss of a loved one, the Masonic funeral is a rite that openly demonstrates for all to see and hear that we as a body deeply care about our fellow man and lodge brother. It is a comfort to the family to know that Brother Masons stand ready to pay last respects at the grave site or memorial service and that they share in the loss of the fall-The family and community of en Mason. friends see the Masonic fraternity in a most favorable light when we so honor his life. Just like a regular lodge, a Lodge of Sorrow needs at least five brothers to perform the ceremony.

Masonic Funerals, like so many masonic functions, provide an opportunity for a lodge to demonstrate their support to both the deceased brother and his family. We are seen clothed as Masons in public. The majority of the surviving family members of our brother are not masons. Our decorum and sincerity are great masonic calling cards.

Hill City Lodge is well versed in officiating at Masonic Funerals. Due to the advanced age of a Brother or family situation it is sometimes necessary to furnish six pall bearers as well as the five officers of the funeral. The expression of gratitude and words of thanks from the family members make the time spent in attending so very worthwhile. If you would like to have your name added to the list of members called to attend funerals please see the lodge secretary and we will insure that your are notified.

and 257 Texians died, while most historians of the Alamo agree that around 600 Mexicans were killed or wounded. Several noncombatants were sent to Gonzales to spread word of the Texian defeat. The news sparked both a strong rush to join the Texian army and a panic, known as "The Runaway Scrape", in which the Texian army, most settlers, and the new, self-proclaimed but officially unrecognized, Republic of Texas government fled eastward toward the United States ahead of the advancing Mexican Army.

Within Mexico, the battle has often been overshadowed by events from the Mexican—American War of 1846–48. In 19th-century Texas, the Alamo complex gradually became known as a battle site rather than a former mission. The Texas Legislature purchased the land and buildings in the early part of the 20th century and designated the Alamo chapel as an official Texas State Shrine.
